COVID-19 Vaccine Update 2.22.21

Hello Leslie,

Below is the latest information on where and when to get the COVID-19 vaccine in Connecticut.

Today Governor Lamont announced that Connecticut will be opening COVID-19

vaccines to residents 55 and over beginning March 1st, along with school staff working inside the school building and childcare workers.

The Governor has temporarily set up the following timeline for other age groups to register in Connecticut:

55+: March 1 45-54: March 22 35-44: April 12 All age groups: May 3

Appointments at Greenwich Town Hall and the Eastern Greenwich Civic Center, or other locations in the area must be registered at State of CT VAMS (Vaccine Administration Management System): **CLICK HERE FOR VAMS**.

Or call the CT COVID Vaccine Appointment Assistance Line 1-877-918-2224, Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. A call-back option will be offered when specialists are busy assisting other callers.

There is also a new drive-through clinic in Stamford at the Lord & Taylor parking lot on Long Ridge Road. Appointments can only be made via telephone by calling the Vaccine Appointment Assistance Line 1-877-918-2224.

Please be patient. New spots are opening up every day as vaccines arrive in the state.

We have not yet heard of any local pharmacies in southern Fairfield County offering vaccines. Unfortunately doctors' offices are still not being included but the state of CT has done a very good job of providing several convenient sites and attempting to simplify the process.

In the meantime, we still want to remind you to wear your mask, wash your hands, and maintain physical distance to help prevent the spread and keep yourselves safe.
